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HOPE (EVEN JESUS HAD TO WAIT)

"I should be an expert at waiting by now." Have you ever thought that before?

With all the years behind me, all the events and experiences I've had to wait for, you would think I would have the whole waiting thing down by now. I've waited for many things:

- As a child, waiting for Christmas morning to arrive so I could open the gifts waiting for me
- Waiting for the day I could get my driver's license and have my own car (freedom!)
- Day after day of school, then college, waiting for that summer break to have a moment of freedom from homework
- Becoming engaged and waiting for the wedding day to arrive and see to my bride in her wedding dress
- Counting down the days expectantly, waiting for a family vacation to relax and unwind
- Waiting for test results to come back to know what might change my life
- Waiting those nine months for each of my children to be born and see them in person for the first time

The list goes on...I'm sure you have your own. Big things and small things. Now, I find myself owning a home that needs remodeling and lots of fine-tuning to become the place my family wants it to be. When we bought the home, we knew it would take work and lots of it. Our mentality was simple: Work on it as we could, when we could, and as we could afford it, and over time it would all get done. All of it...but not all at once. We would have to wait.

I find myself often revisiting my to-do list as the weeks and months tick by. Once one project is done, another is waiting to take its place...and another, and another. I look around at the things that need to be fixed, worked on, and made right around me and know that someday, those things will be fixed and they will become better. For now, I have to wait.

As we step into the Advent season, I am thankful for the way that Advent reminds us that waiting is good for us. After all, Jesus had to wait. The Advent season reminds us to slow down, to anticipate, to look for the little things, to drink in hope and peace and love in a season of business and stress. We are reminded to let our hearts and minds dwell on the Messiah who was to come (and how we wait for Jesus to come again).

We remember those who waited for the birth of a Savior, for the one who would bring light to a dark world. They had hope, in their waiting, that this Savior would come and make all things right. But if we move just past that miraculous event just a bit we are met with another reality: Jesus had to grow up. He didn't start his ministry for some odd 30 years.

That means that Jesus had to wait. Wait...really?

We don't think about that often. Jesus had to wait.

Why would that be? God could have immediately made things right in the world and put everything in place. He could have somehow fashioned Jesus to act sooner, to live faster, to be older — any other crazy idea you could think of — any of it was possible for the God of all creation to do. And yet, Jesus was born into a human family and had to grow up. He was a toddler. He was a tween. He went through puberty (sorry, I know). He had to learn and explore and spend days working and living and eating and sleeping and doing chores and helping the community around him — so many things as he waited for his time to arrive.

I like to think about how, in the waiting, Jesus lived his life among the people he would one day save. Much like my house that needs remodeling, Jesus spent his life growing up around the very people who were sick, diseased, broken, dying, and in need of a savior. He saw it all around him, all the time, for years and years, and he had to wait to do something about it. He knew these people were just looking for hope, somewhere, somehow. Jesus was that hope; there was hope in the waiting. Jesus looked around him and knew that some day, those people would be fixed, that they would be made right, that they would be saved. One day, but not right now. There was waiting, and there was hope in the waiting.

And so, if Jesus had to wait, we certainly can.

No matter what it is you find yourself waiting for today, we can rest knowing that hope finds a place in our waiting. We hope for what's to come. When we wait with Jesus, that hope is never wasted. Maybe right now you just need to be reminded to slow down and think about Jesus deeply for a moment, let the waiting do its work, and know that one day, all will be right.

WEEK 2

ABUNDANT PEACE

"And the angel came to her and said, "Rejoice, favored woman! The Lord is with you." But she was deeply troubled by this statement, wondering what kind of greeting this could be." **LUKE 1:28-29 HSCB**

When you think of the word peace, what comes to mind?

I used to think peace was the absence of hard, the absence of conflict or strife in any form. The vision of a placid lake, so smooth you can see the perfect reflection of everything surrounding it- serene, ideal, perfectly calm.

But the longer I live, and experience life with Jesus in the midst of this broken world, the more I can relate to Mary in this passage from Luke. Mary receives this abundantly beautiful, yet terribly perplexing news and she is immediately questioning. The Prince of Peace is quite literally about to dwell inside of her, and instead of being overcome with a peaceful calm, she is wondering what this could possibly mean for her.

Peace is not the absence of hard, it's the presence of God in the midst of it.

The very essence of Jesus, born as a baby, the light of the world transcending the darkness, is the perfect picture of peace. He entered the world, right in the midst of confusion and uncertainty. Offering Himself to us in unexpectedly glorious ways. The peace He bears is all-encompassing and makes no rational sense. It's a baby born of a virgin, to a willing but scared mother. It's an impossibly beautiful miracle right in the midst of pain and darkness. It's hearing



unfathomable news and receiving the Spirit's presence-shalom peace-right in the midst of the swirling dark. The peace we deeply desire is given from a place of abundance, when all we can see is wilderness.

"For water will gush in the wilderness, and streams in the desert;

ISAIAH 35:6B HCSB

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God transcends time and space and fills us with His immeasurably more, but not in the absence of darkness or hard—no. Rather, it's the darkest nights where He shines the brightest. It's in the moments of open-handed desperation, or a weak reach towards Him while it's still dark- with nothing to offer but a trembling yes. This is the place where The light clashes with the dark and suddenly we begin to experience the miracle of Advent unfolding in our midst.

His unexpected, glorious peace.

"Mary responded, "I am the Lord's servant. May everything you have said about me come true." LUKE 1:38 NLT

Friends, as we enter into this second week of Advent, may you receive peace in the darkness. May you begin to know more deeply the person of Jesus and the peace He embodies. May you invite Him into the middle of your story, while it's still dark and uncertain. May you bring your questions and fears to Him. He will meet you right where you are. The night may feel long but He is the everlasting Prince of Peace.

FAITH > FACE

I stared at my feet as I sat in my counselor's office. They had been working so hard to take one step in front of the other lately. Why was it so hard to feel the joy and wonder of Christmas this year? I'm typically the one who has a house decked out in sparkles, snowflakes, and stockings while belting out Mariah Carey's "All I want for Christmas is You". Yup, I'm really that person. But this time around it took everything within me to get the decoration bins out of the basement. I kind of just wanted to hide down there with them.

Maybe you can relate. Or maybe you sense joy bubbling up in you during this season, and that is something worth celebrating! It's important and even beneficial for us, as believers, to fully unwrap the joy of the Lord like a child opening gifts on Christmas morning. Take it all in and spread that joy all around! But I have had to be reminded that joy isn't a feeling as much as it is a practice that needs to be cultivated.

Have you ever pictured Jesus' face when he was tested in the desert before he started his ministry? I think it can be easy to assume that Jesus was always bright-eyed and smiling. That's why I've geeked out on the show, "The Chosen" because I love the way they depict Jesus' humanity. The show has invited me to get curious and imagine what Jesus may have felt like in different moments of hardship and how he carried that hardship in his body and face. When we read this story of Jesus being tested,





Satan came with lies and deception while Jesus was weak and vulnerable. Satan wanted him to put his trust elsewhere. But Jesus was resolute and responded with the promises and commandments of God. This is the way joy is cultivated. In times of weakness and despair, we, by faith, dig deep past the feelings, shame, and lies, into the promises and commandments of God. This doesn't mean we should ignore or stuff those feelings and trade them in for some kind of jolly Santa Claus kind of joy. Instead, we dig deep and stare darkness in the eye telling it that we will not be overcome! This Advent season, I want to ask us to consider something: what if joy isn't always expressed through our face, but through our faith? The kind of faith where even though you may not see God now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy (1 Peter 1:8)

So as you hear Christmas carols playing overhead at the store or on the radio in your car, remember there is another song being sung over you. "The Lord your God is with you, a mighty one who will save; He will take great delight in you; he will quiet you by his love; he will rejoice over you with loud singing" (Zephaniah 3:17). And this song is true whether your home is decked out with Christmas decor or whether it's still tucked away down in the basement.

Joy isn't sustained by presents, parties, and positivity; joy is sustained by a person and His promises that never fail.

"I love you sweetie", I said as I smothered my little girl with kisses before she went to bed.

"Ok, ok, mom, I got it", as she rubbed off the kisses. But she knows the routine. I'm going to keep kissing her if she keeps wiping them off. I hope my love for her never feels stale.

Whether you've grown up in the church or not, the idea of God's love can sometimes lose its potency. Maybe it's hard for you to believe and receive it, or maybe you've just become too familiar with the idea of His love. There are times when we need to choose to believe in God's love for us even when we don't feel it. But His love is also meant to be experienced and enjoyed, tasted and seen.

Do you remember when the song "How He Loves Us" was on repeat at churches all over the country back in the early 2000s? Ok, maybe some of you had just been born around that time while I was off living the good ol' college days; but hey, it's still listed in the top 10 worship songs of the 2000s! If you haven't heard it before, look up the John Mark McMillan version, it's the original one! There were varving reactions to his lyrics, "so heaven meets earth like a sloppy wet kiss", and I get it. It's kind of out there and is so different from what we are used to with our typical pragmatic ways of relating to God. But maybe that's exactly the point. Maybe we've gotten so used to the idea of a methodical kind of love that we've missed the unreserved, unrelenting, and unconditional love of God

God has always been in pursuit of us; that's why He sent Jesus. Emmanuel, God with us. Love embodied for us. He is truly everything we've been longing for.

Just like love came in an unexpected way as a baby wrapped in swaddling clothes, what are some ways you can look for God's love to meet you in unexpected ways this season?

How can you embody God's love and extend it to someone else during this Advent season? Is it leaving baked goods for the delivery driver? Or making Christmas cards for your neighbors? Or slowing down to check in with a friend that's having a hard time this season?

So maybe God doesn't come at us with a sloppy wet kiss, or perhaps he does. Either way, I think he feels what I feel toward my kids to an even greater measure. He doesn't want us to wipe off his kisses, although He'll gladly keep pouring out more of His affection. He wants us to take it all in! He doesn't want His love to become old news to us, but the best news that we get to receive again and again.

In this Advent season, may we be people that receive God's love fully, and also people that extend it fully to those around us.

AROUND THE TABLE

ADVENT CANDLE

Light all four of the candles. **READ:** Isaiah 9:6

SHARE: Jesus' name means "the Lord is salvation"! Share with each other what your name means (Google is your friend for this). Then share the story behind your name if you know it. Finally, light the Christ candle.

READ

If you are with your family or Local Group, take turns reading the following passage out loud.



In those days a decree went out from Caesar Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration when Quirinius was governor of Syria. And all went to be registered, each to bis own town. And Joseph also went up from Galilee, from the town of Nazareth, to Judea, to the city of David, which is called Bethlehem, because he was of the house and lineage of David, to be registered with Mary, his betrothed, who was with child. And while they were there, the time came for her to give birth. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in swaddling cloths and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

And in the same region there were shepherds out in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And an angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were filled with great fear. And the angel said to them, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in swaddling cloths and bying in a manger." And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace among those with whom he is pleased!"

When the angels went away from them into beaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go over to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has made known to us." And they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby lying in a manger. And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart. And the shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

- Oh God, in the middle of the storm I am setting my hope on you. You fight for me and you are greater than all my enemies. Nothing I face today is more powerful than you. You are the solid ground beneath my feet. Thank you for surrounding those who surround me. Give me peace in the presence of my enemies, knowing that You see me and defend me in your love. Amen.
- Father, thank you for the name of Jesus. Jesus, there is no other name like yours. You humbly came and laid your life down. Now you are exalted to the highest place of all. I bend my knees to you today. Your Name alone sets me free. I want my life and breath to make much of the Name that is greater than all others. Amen

EVENING PRAYERS

- Oh Lord, as we rest tonight, give us peace. As we close the day, remind us of how you love us. You meet us in the stillness, in the silence, and call to us there. Tonight, we respond to your calling. Would you bring us closer to you and to your heart? Your ways are higher, your ways are greater.
 We give over all the ways we try to take control. In this Advent season, remind us that you have a plan and a purpose for us. We love you. Amen
- Jesus, your yoke is easy and your burden is light. We come to place in your hands the burdens we have felt today. We have carried this weight and it is heavy, so we give it to you. You are able to carry it and help us face all that we are going through. In this Advent season, remind us that your strength is quiet, confident, and capable. We pause and give you these things we carry. Thank you for helping us and for loving us so deeply. You do not leave us alone. Amen.
- Father, I praise you for coming and leading me out of dark places, into the light of your love. I renounce everything that opposes You and

seeks to separate us. Unite mankind in your peace. Give me love for all people. In this Advent season, remind us of why you came. You came to help the hurt, the broken, and the lost. Let my heart be tuned to yours. Come, Emmanuel, and be with me. Christ in me, my peace. Amen.

- Oh Jesus, as we lay our heads down tonight, let us think of how you rescued us. In the stillness of the night, a baby was born. In the darkness of the night, a light burst forth to bring hope to everyone. You lived a perfect life and died a perfect death so that we might have life in you. In this Advent season let us remember that your sacrifice was our rescue. And you will come again. We wait for your return. Come quickly, Lord Jesus! Amen.
- Father, tonight we praise your name. Glory in the highest to the King of Kings. We trust you with our present and our future. You love those who can't earn your love or deserve it. We are those people. We can't earn your love, but you give it as a gift to us. In this Advent season, we remember that yours was the perfect gift, given freely. We receive it with grateful hearts. May our lives be fixed on you in all that we do. Amen.
